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A. The Project

a. Background of the Project

Chu Hai College of Higher Education (the College) has launched a three-year project – Enhancement of Student Support and Career Guidance Services, supported by the Quality Enhancement Grant Scheme of the Education Bureau. The project commenced in July 2009.

b. Main Objectives of the Project

The project aims to enhance the quality and variety of the College's existing services in the student support and career guidance services.

c. The Implementation of the Project

There are three stages to be completed within three years, from July 2009 to June 2012 with six half-year phases. The project activities will enhance and broaden the scope for practical career guidance and promote the cultivation of positive attitudes and values to students' life, studies and careers. The College has allocated more resources to individualized student support and career guidance services through the Student Affairs Office. A Career Resources Centre will also be established as a means of providing and maintaining a long-term career guidance support to our students.

Description of Milestones

a) Senior students to be student-leaders (The annual Leadership Programme will have trained at least 200 students)

Under the Leadership Training Programme, a series of leadership training camps and individual workshops were arranged within the period. The SAO organized a series of workshops in August to prepare committee members for organizing O'camp for new students. To kick off the training, a team building workshop was held to build trust and stronger interpersonal skills among committee members from different associations. 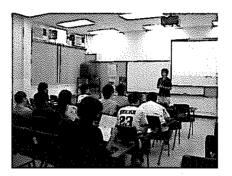

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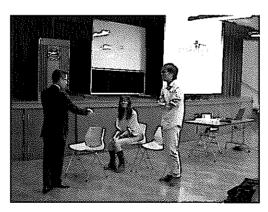

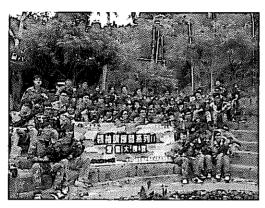


One leadership-training camp was held in December. The camp aimed to unleash and explore participants' potentials in becoming a leader of their own and among their peers. According to our evaluation, this camp scored 4.3 out of 5 in the overall satisfactory category. In particular, the category on learning about their potentials, importance of teamwork, and personal growth experience scored over 80%. Students were encouraged to reflect on their experience upon completion of various teamwork

activities in relation to self-confidence, problem solving, communication, tolerance and decision-making skills.

A portion of the trained-leaders were elected by their peers to become committee members of their associations while another portion of the trained-leaders were actively involved in community projects under the Social Service Group.

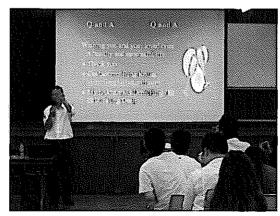

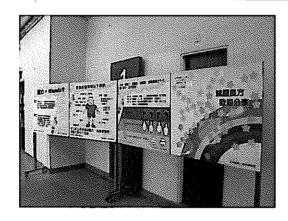

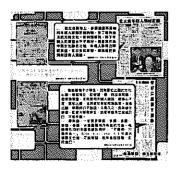
